SUBJECT: LOS ANGELES COMBINED CHARITIES CAMPAIGN

RECOMMENDED ACTION

- 1) It is recommended that the Board of Police Commissioners (Board) **REVIEW** and **APPROVE** the application submitted for participation in the Los Angeles Combined Charities Campaign (LACCC).
- 2) That the Board **TRANSMITS** this report to the Office of the Controller (Controller).
- 3) That the Controller work with the American Cancer Society to set up a payroll deduction program enabling all City Personnel to contribute to said organization.

DISCUSSION

The applicant, American Cancer Society, California Division, Inc. is a California nonprofit organization requesting participation in the LACCC per Los Angeles Municipal Code (LAMC), Section 4.203.

Deductions for Charitable Contributions Section 4.203.1(a) states any employee may authorize the payment, by payroll deductions, of contributions to charitable organizations approved by the Police Department (Department). The Department shall have the authority, pursuant to this article, to authorize such payroll deductions and to promulgate and administer rules to implement payroll deductions for charitable organizations.

Attached are documents and information to satisfy the requirements of LAMC Section 4.203.1, and qualify the applicant for participation in the LACCC, as the net proceeds will be used for charitable purposes and to support organizations in the Greater Los Angeles area.

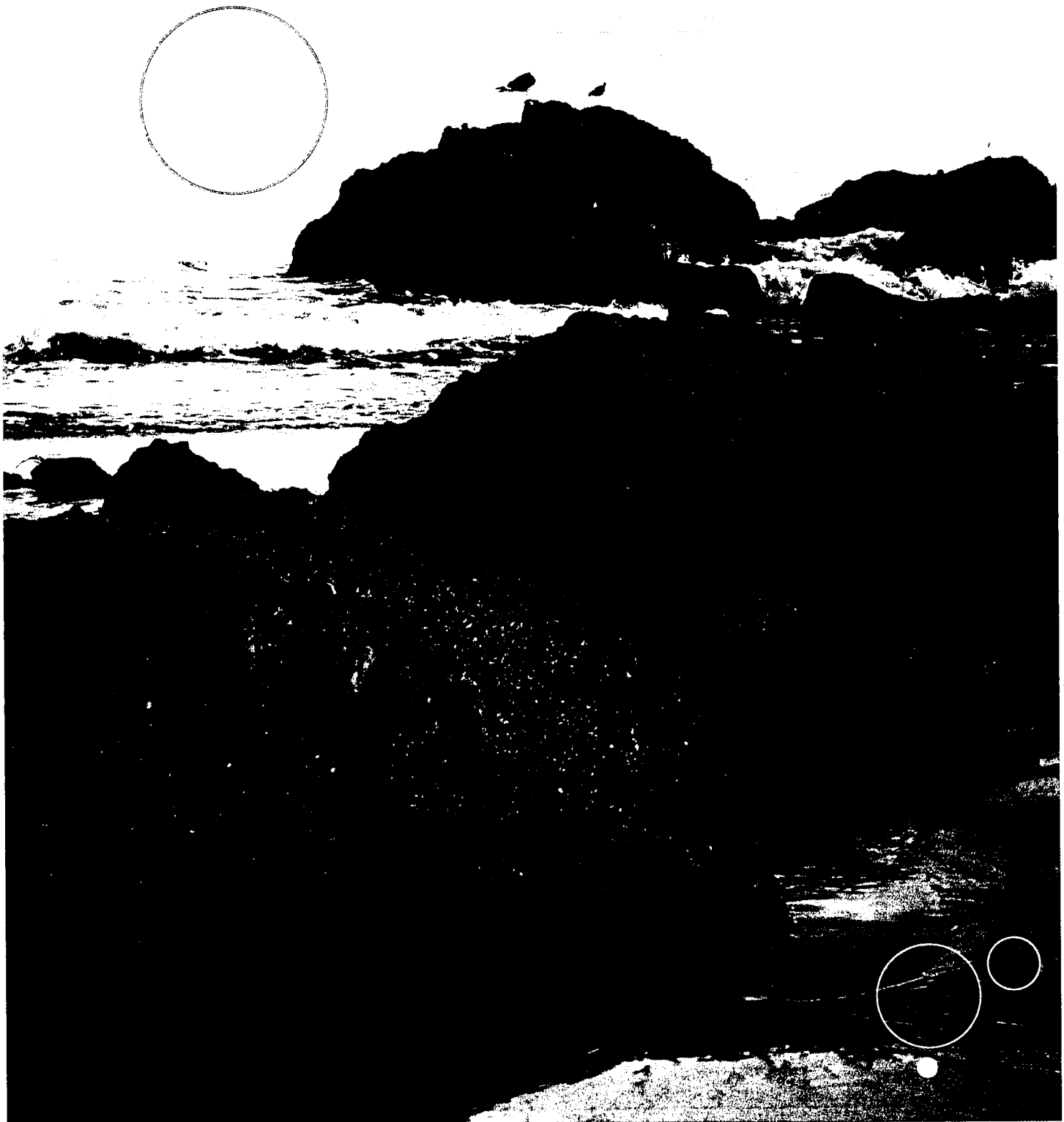
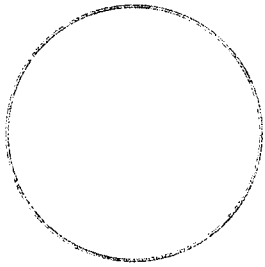

- Relationship managers work with district level school contacts to implement **Teens Kick Ash** and **Spring Into Health**. **Teens Kick Ash** is a program that targets middle school and high school students to educate them on the dangers of tobacco and empowers them to fight against the tobacco industry. **Spring into Health** promotes the consumption of fruits and vegetables and encourages 60 minutes of physical activity. This program is targeted to 4th & 5th grade level students.
- Relationship managers also work with district level school contacts on the promotion of the **Coordinated School Health Program**. The **Coordinated School Health Program** addresses health behaviors identified by the Center for Disease Control (CDC). They are tobacco use, unhealthy dietary behaviors, inadequate physical activity, alcohol and other drug use, sexual behaviors that can result in HIV infection, other sexually transmitted diseases, unintended pregnancies, and intentional and unintentional injuries. ACS promotes that schools address the health of the whole child and coordinate health services to increase academic achievement and to foster healthy behaviors among youth and their families.
- Relationship managers work with student leaders to develop **ACS Youth Clubs** on High School campuses. **ACS Youth Clubs** implement cancer education to their peers and faculty, they participate in fund-raising activities such as Relay for Life and Daffodil Days, and they promote and honor cancer survivors.

Dear Friends,

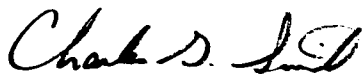
For the second year cancer deaths in the United States have declined. This is exciting news for the American Cancer Society and evidence that we are, indeed, turning the tide in the battle against cancer. The surge of research-related success in Los Angeles County during the 2006 – 2007 fiscal year included recruitment of nearly 500 Cancer Prevention Study 3 participants at two Relay For Life sites. Recruitment will continue in 2008 at the Long Beach (May 2), Santa Clarita Valley (May 31) and Southeast Cities (June 7) Relays.

We could not have funded our groundbreaking research, prevention, early detection and free patient services programs without you, our volunteers and donors. Last year the Saddle Baron's Ball raised \$256,500, the Southern California Invitational golf tournament raised \$260,000, Daffodil Days netted \$557,000 and the Region's seven Discovery Shops provided the Society \$950,589 through the sale of gently-used, high-quality merchandise, a 36% return after expenses. Relay For Life brought in \$4.7 million this year alone. More than \$11 million has been raised by California Spirit over the past 23 years to help achieve our goal of reducing cancer incidence by 25 percent, cancer deaths by 50 percent and measurably improving the quality of life of cancer patients and their families by the year 2015.

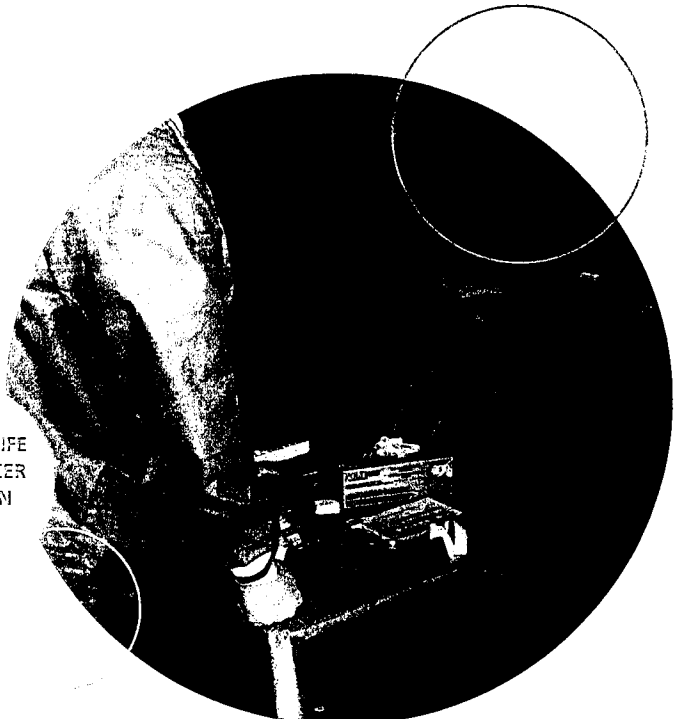
Central to that goal is improved access to care for all Americans with cancer. I hope you have seen our ads on television, radio and in print positioning access to health care in the context of the American Cancer Society brand and through the cancer lens. Using real stories and studies of cancer patients we hope to educate the public and policymakers about what is wrong with the health care system in the United States, and the opportunities that exist to fix it.

The goal of the campaign is to build heightened awareness of the issue, frame the dialogue from a cancer perspective, and drive consumers to the Society to learn how they can help. National leadership recognizes that the biggest barrier to reaching the 2015 challenge goals is an inadequate health care system that denies millions of people timely access to quality cancer care. With evidence mounting that solving the cancer problem is linked to solving the larger health care access problem, the Society's National Board of Directors has developed a non-partisan strategy to implement the charge and save countless lives.

As I end my term as chair of the American Cancer Society's Los Angeles Region, I thank you for your ongoing support in the fight against cancer. With your help we are turning the tide.

PREVENTION & EARLY DETECTION

Early detection and prevention are vital to stemming the tide of cancer, especially among the diverse, low socioeconomic and medically underserved populations disproportionately affected by cancer. Recent waves of progress in preventing cancer by impacting lifestyle choices and detecting the disease at its earliest, most curable stage are the result of reaching specific populations in a culturally sensitive and timely manner.

MEDICALLY UNDERSERVED POPULATIONS

·**In March**, 400 leaders from the Chinese-American community attended a Mandarin-language educational forum on colorectal and breast cancers.

·**In April**, *Together We Can: Ending Health Disparities in the African American Community*, reached more than 230 community leaders.

·**During National Multicultural Cancer Awareness Week** more than 100 Southeast Cities community members attended a Spanish-language forum about breast, colon and cervical cancers, the HPV vaccine and ACS programs and services.

·**In June** more than 150 community leaders, promotoras, and stakeholders attended *Eliminating Cancer Disparities in the Latino Community: What You Need To Know*. The Circle of Life American Indian Tell A Friend program increased awareness of mammography benefits and screening guidelines among Native American and Alaskan women and the fourth annual Gay Men's Summit provided early detection and treatment information at a prostate cancer breakout session.

·**The LA Region's forum** at which more than 360 Korean Americans received information about the most prevalent cancers in Korean men and women – including colon, breast, lung and stomach – received the California Division's Collaboration Award.

·**Partners in our efforts** to reach underserved populations included Wells Fargo, USC Norris Cancer Hospital, Herald Cancer Association, 100 Black Men of LA, First AME Church, Real Men Cook Foundation, LA Urban League, Binational Border Health Division, Vision y Compromiso, Korean American Medical Association for Southern California, Korean Health Education Information and Research Center, Asian American Network for Cancer Awareness, Research and Training, Partnered for Progress, United American Indian Involvement and many others.

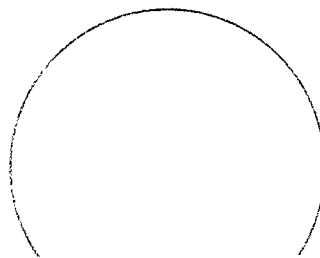
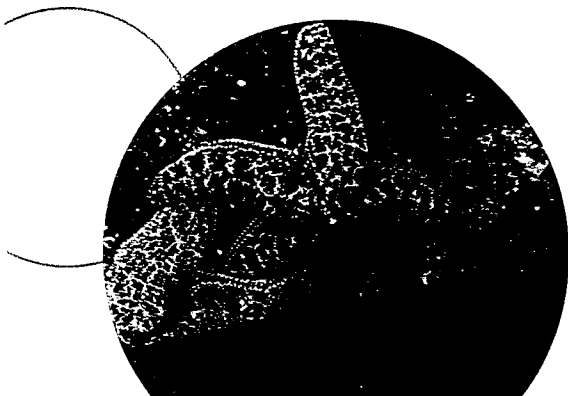
Effective cancer education begins with our youth, and the American Cancer Society has created successful programs targeting fourth and fifth graders as well as 18 – 24-year-olds on college campuses, including:

·**Healthier Schools:** The American Cancer Society's Coordinated School Health Program promoted a healthier school environment at the Los Angeles County Coordinated School Health Leadership Institute's series of six sessions to educate major school districts throughout the community. Participants learned how to encourage more nutritious diets, more active lifestyles, and lifestyle choices that will help students prevent cancer.

·**Colleges Against Cancer:** College students continue to make a difference in the lives of those facing cancer. At Childrens Hospital Los Angeles, USC Colleges Against Cancer students presented a forum for teen cancer patients and their families about USC's financial aid services and the Society's Young Cancer Survivors Scholarship. The club also held a holiday book drive for young cancer patients at the facility.

Workplace Solutions is the Society's answer to growing demand from employers to reduce the incidence of chronic disease in their workforce and improve employee morale. These cost-

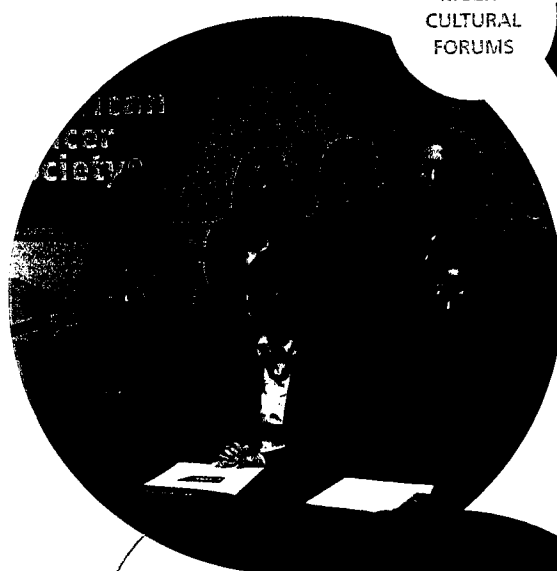

- **A Division-wide pilot program in the LA Region** produced informational tissue boxes, magazine labels and business cards that were placed in the reception areas of select health care facilities resulting in a sea of new patient referrals and calls to our 800 number.
- **Riding a huge swell of support**, this year's Daffodil Days swept hope and sunshine across Los Angeles with 10,400 Gift of Hope bouquets delivered to cancer patients at treatment centers throughout the county. Donald Trump's "Apprentice" winner Stefanie Schaeffer and Miss California delivered bouquets to Childrens Hospital Los Angeles.
- **The Long-Beach Cancer League-funded Camp Summersault** in Long Beach provided a free week of safe summer fun for 100 young cancer patients and their siblings. Activities included a high ropes course, campfires, field games and arts and crafts.

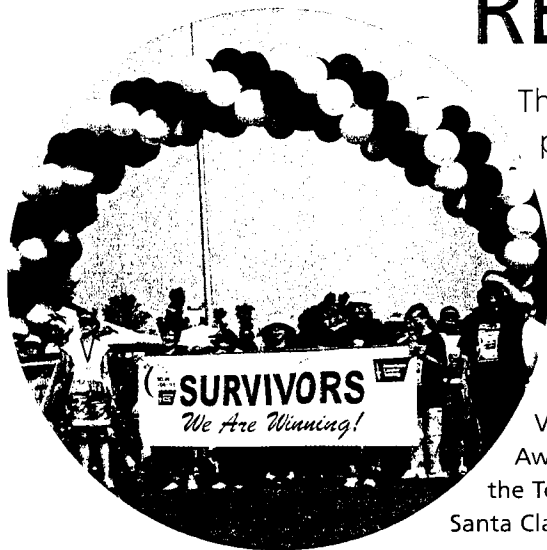

RELAY FOR LIFE

This year Relay For Life put an increased emphasis on educating Relay participants about ACS programs and services, and delivering life-saving cancer prevention and early detection messages.



During 2006-2007 the Los Angeles Region hosted 54 Relays For Life and reeled in \$4.7 million for ACS programs and services. Some 2,000 Relay teams, including 4,600 cancer survivors, jumped in to join the fight against cancer.

The Region received Circle of Excellence Awards for the Downey, San Fernando Valley and UCLA Relays. In addition Downey RFL received the Greatest Growth Income Award, USC RFL earned the Increasing Awareness Award and El Segundo RFL received the Top Baby Relay Award (out of five new Relays), raising \$186,612 in its first year. The Santa Clarita RFL received the Society's Pacesetter Award.

Colleges Against Cancer chapters raised more than \$111,000 at USC; in excess of \$121,000 at UCLA, and \$39,000 at the first Occidental College Relay.

At every Relay volunteer "Legislative Ambassadors" floated through the crowd to collect "Picture A Cure" stories to send to local and federal legislators, and recruited new members for the American Cancer Society Cancer Action Network (ACS CAN).

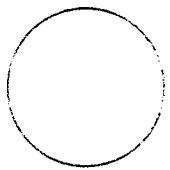

MARKETING COMMUNICATION

Marketing Communication efforts brought widespread attention to cancer prevention and early detection through collaboration with a variety of community partners:

- Three leading Asian American PR firms, the IW Group, InterTrend and AAAZa, debuted the third in their series of Asian colon cancer awareness campaigns, this year's in Vietnamese featuring actress Kieu Chinh (the Joy Luck Club). Funding was provided by USC Norris Cancer Center.
- The Chivas USA soccer team produced one Spanish and one English 30-second television PSA featuring player's Maykel Galindo and Brad Guzon. Focusing on the Society's free services and programs, the Spanish-language spot aired on four Univision TV stations in Los Angeles, Sacramento, Fresno and San Diego reaching more than 1.2 million viewers. Most of the production costs were provided pro bono.
- LAGRANT Communications and the Region's Marketing Communication Department were awarded a Platinum Marcom Award for our statewide community-based marketing campaign to increase colon cancer awareness among African Americans. Public service announcements aired on radio and television and 17,000 hand-held fans depicting a hip 50ish African American woman astride a Harley. The fans were distributed through African American churches and underwritten by Harley Davidson.

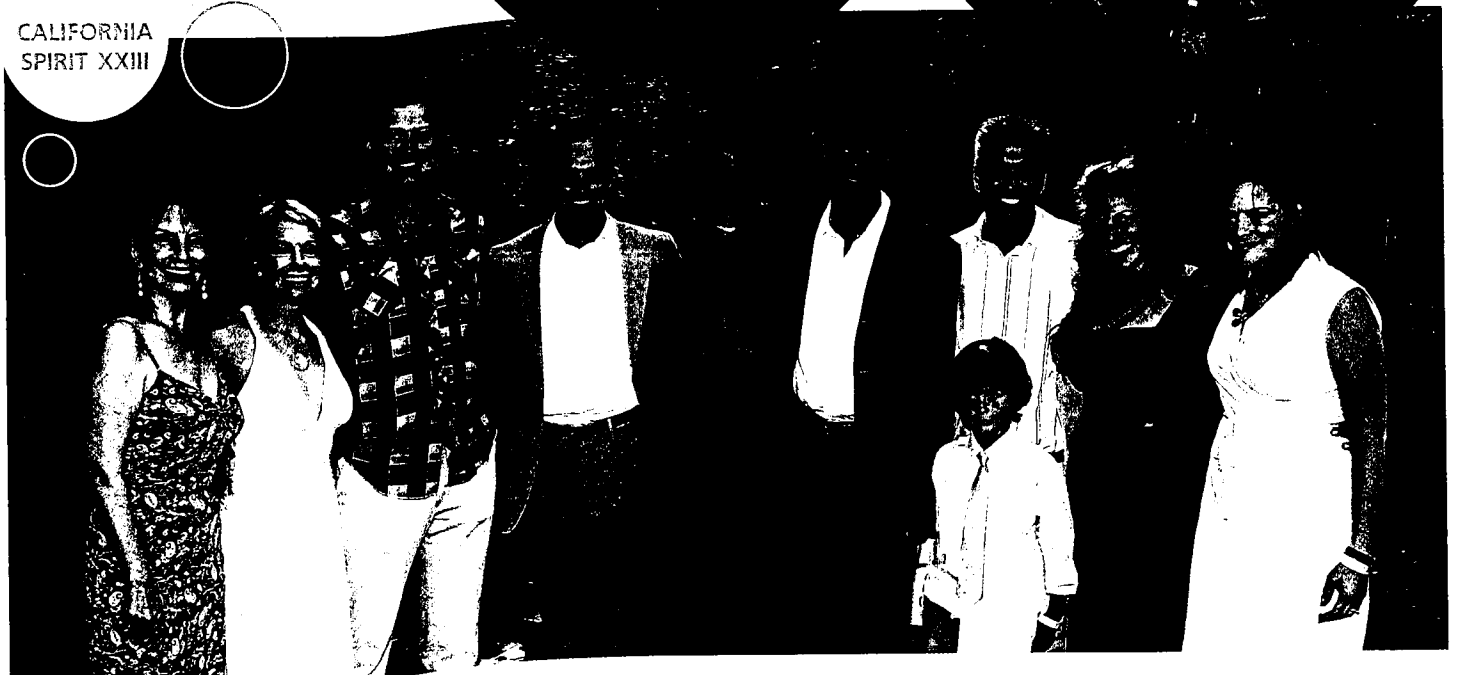
SADDLE BARON'S BALL
