DISCUSSION

- A. This donation will fund Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) training for two Robbery-Homicide Division (RHD), Special Investigation Section (SIS) detectives. Hosted by the University of California, Los Angeles (UCLA) Center for Prehospital Care, this accelerated course will run for three weeks from January 4 to January 30, 2021. Upon completion, the SIS detectives will receive EMT certification and be equipped with valuable emergency medical skills to provide pre-hospital first aid and trauma care for injured officers, suspects, and civilians. Approval of this grant will also allow the detectives to bring back the principles of basic tactical medicine to SIS, enhancing the Section's safety and knowledge base. - B. This donation will fund two tactical medical emergency service bags for SIS. Manufactured by Tactical and Survival Specialties, Inc., these bags are more lightweight and compact than the bags currently being used by SIS EMTs, enabling more maneuverability and speed when deploying from vehicles during tactical incidents involving victims with traumatic injuries. Approval of this grant will also provide identical continuity among the Los Angeles Fire Department Tactical Emergency Medical Services (TEMS) units, the Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) EMTs, and LAPD SIS EMTs. - C. This donation will fund two eight-week sessions of equine therapy for selected 77th Street Community Relations Office (CRO) officers and at-risk youth within the community. Hosted by the Free Rein Foundation, the equine therapy program is tailored to help youth build confidence, empathy, and teamwork, as well as develop coping skills for dealing with any negative experiences impacting their lives. Officers are a vital part of this process, as their presence helps create a supportive environment for the youth participants. - D. This grant will fund various events and activities aimed at improving the working relationships between the Los Angeles Police Department and the community. The Chief of Police Hosting Fund has previously funded the Media Academy at Davis Training Facility, meetings with the Board of Police Commissioners, City and State officials, and community members, meetings with advocacy groups, and conferences. Approval of this grant will help foster and strengthen relationships between the Los Angeles Police Department and community stakeholders, advocacy groups, law enforcement partners, and leaders from local, State, and the Federal Government. - E. This grant will fund the purchase of ten ballistic helmets from Team Wendy for Robbery-Homicide Division's SIS. Compared to the Department issued helmets, the Team Wendy helmets are lighter in weight, have a slimmer profile, provide greater ballistic protection, and allow for an attachment of a Night Operation Device (NOD) and the simultaneous wearing of a noise-canceling communication device to promote greater situational awareness. In addition, the helmets allow for more maneuverability and speed when deploying from vehicles during high-risk stops and arrests. The ballistic helmets from Team Wendy were reviewed and approved for SIS use by the Department's Uniform Committee in April of 2019. Currently, SIS deploys 24 ballistic helmets that were previously assigned to Metropolitan Division. However, all these helmets have exceeded the five-year ballistic warranty. Approval of this grant will replace a portion of these expired helmets and ensure greater ballistic protection, stability, and retention for SIS officers. 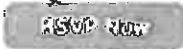

 update: Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, some changes have been made to the course delivery. Lectures which were scheduled to be on-site have been moved to an interactive online format. Skills laboratories are conducted on-site following strict social distancing standards,

and require facial coverings consistent with the guidelines for the County of Los Angeles. Currently all 6 unit exams for the EMT program are being conducted online using a proctoring service which has an additional \$19.75 charge per exam attempt. An exam schedule is provided with the course schedule during orientation to allow students to schedule their exams in advance.

Students are asked to only attend class if they are healthy and students will complete a UCLA Health Symptom Survey for each day they are on-site. Field ride alongs have been suspended during the pandemic, however content provided during the course will make up for this requirement until it is safe to return to the field.

We will continue to update our website for prospective students. Students who are enrolled in a course will receive updates via email from the Center and their course instructor.

EMT Course

Start your healthcare career as an Emergency Medical Technician with Los Angeles' top EMT program. An EMT is a front-line, entry-level healthcare provider who is often the first to provide medical assistance to citizens suffering a medical emergency or traumatic injury. EMT certification and work experience are also critical steps for those seeking Paramedic training. Many doctors, nurses, and other healthcare providers began their careers as EMTs.

Course Formats

Expert UCLA program faculty teach all our EMT courses. Students also complete 24 hours of ride-along shifts with EMS agencies in Los Angeles and will meet EMS agencies looking to recruit UCLA EMT students.

Accelerated EMT Program: This month-long EMT course is a great offering for students looking to start treating patients quickly. Lecture and skills labs are on Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday from 8:00 am-5:00 pm. No class is scheduled on Wednesdays but faculty are available to offer skills guidance, review content, and answer questions. This class format has provided success to thousands of EMTs.

Online EMT Program: This ten-week course has online lectures on Monday and Wednesday, 7:00 - 9:00 pm, self-paced interactive assignments, and skills labs. Skills are on-site depending on the option you select. This may include Saturdays or Sundays (in El Segundo), 8:00am - 6:00pm, or on Tuesday and Thursday evenings (in Westwood), 6:00pm - 10:00pm. Students must attend at least one online lecture at the scheduled time per week. Online lectures are all recorded and posted for students. When enrolling, you will have to select one skills option (Saturdays, Sundays or Tuesday/Thursday evenings) and attend those skills labs for the duration of the course.

Exams: During the online program, you will take six exams. You may visit our location to take the exams or take them online via a third-party service at a cost of \$19.75 for each exam you choose to take online.

Required Materials: In lieu of a textbook, all EMT courses require that you purchase Jones & Bartlett's online course access and Fisdap testing/skills tracking service, for a total cost of \$282.49.

Following successful completion of the EMT program, you will be eligible to take the national certifying exam (National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians -- NREMT) and become licensed as an EMT through your local county.

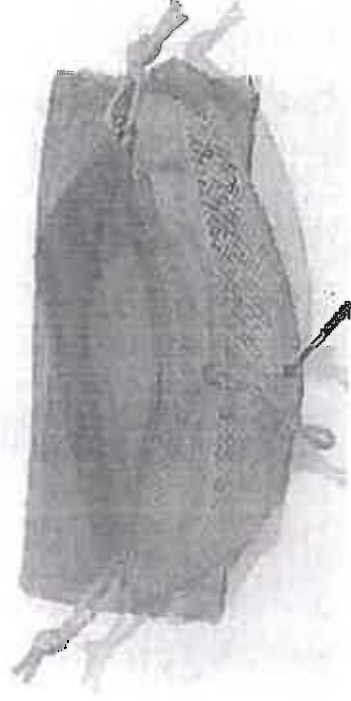

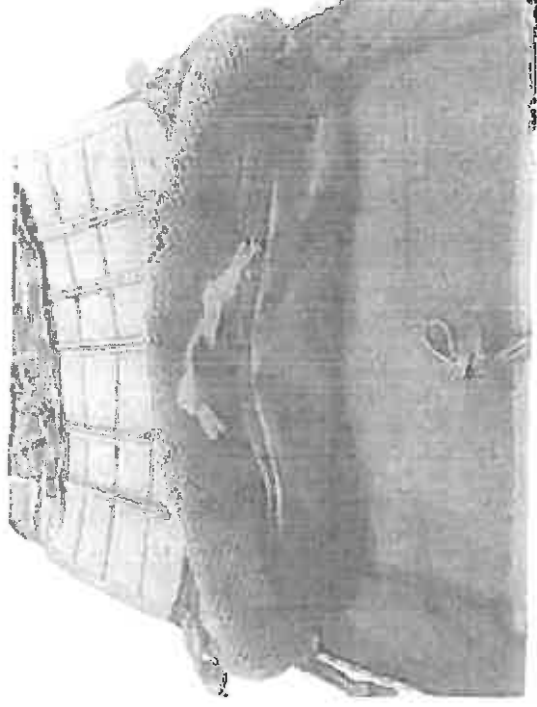

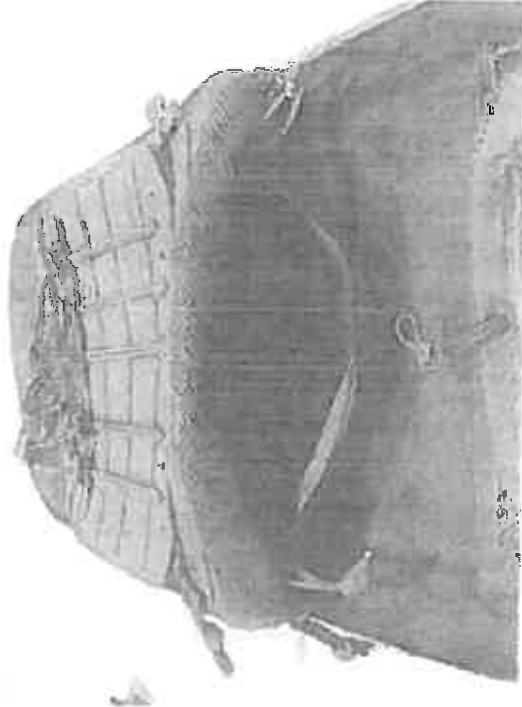

Exterior Zipper Open

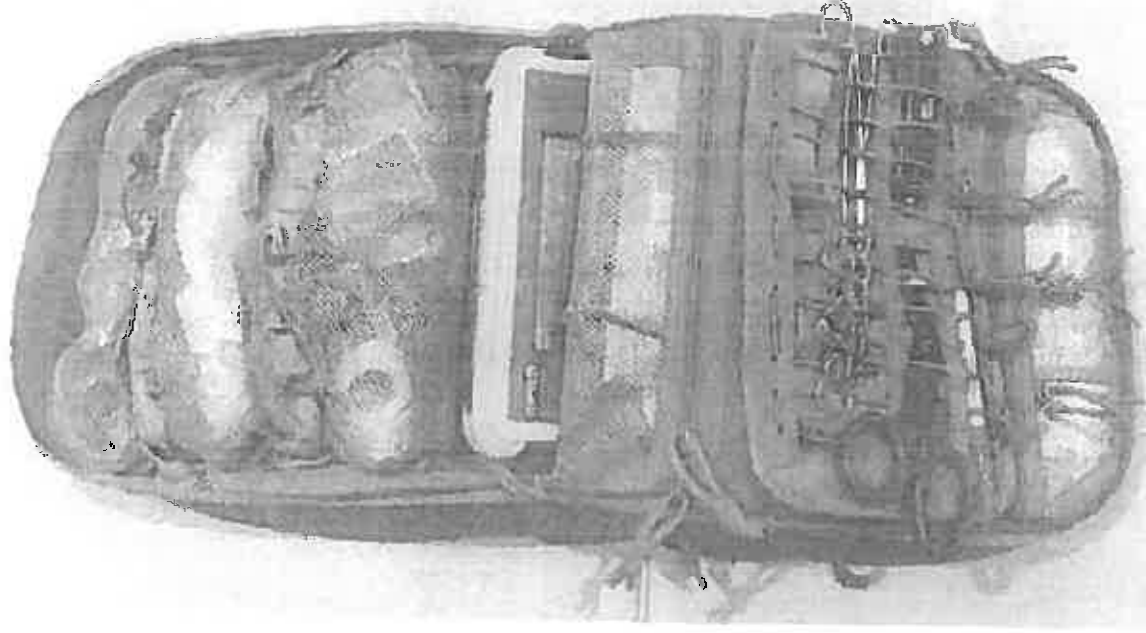
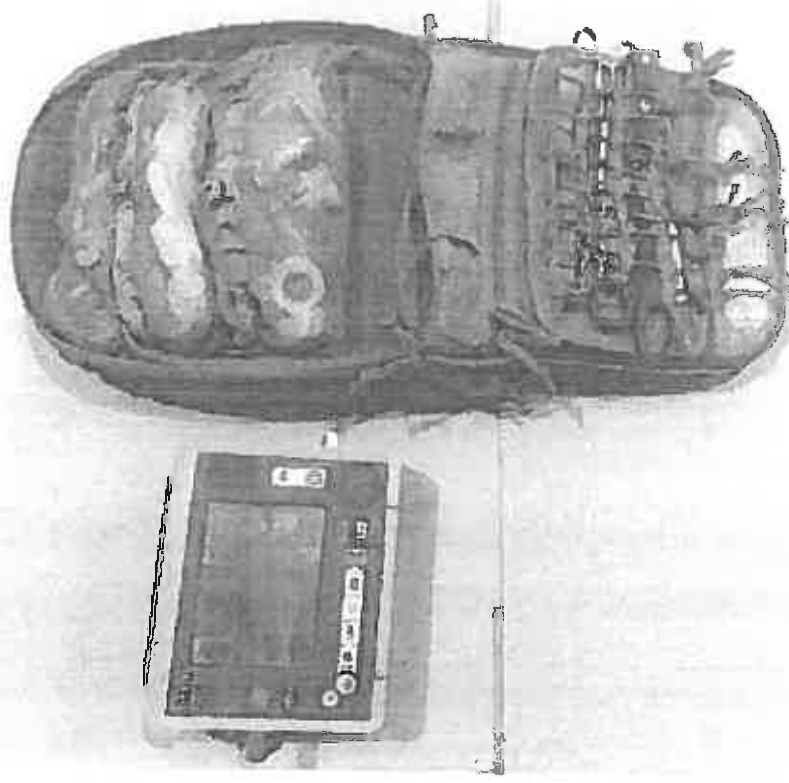


Interior Zipper Closed

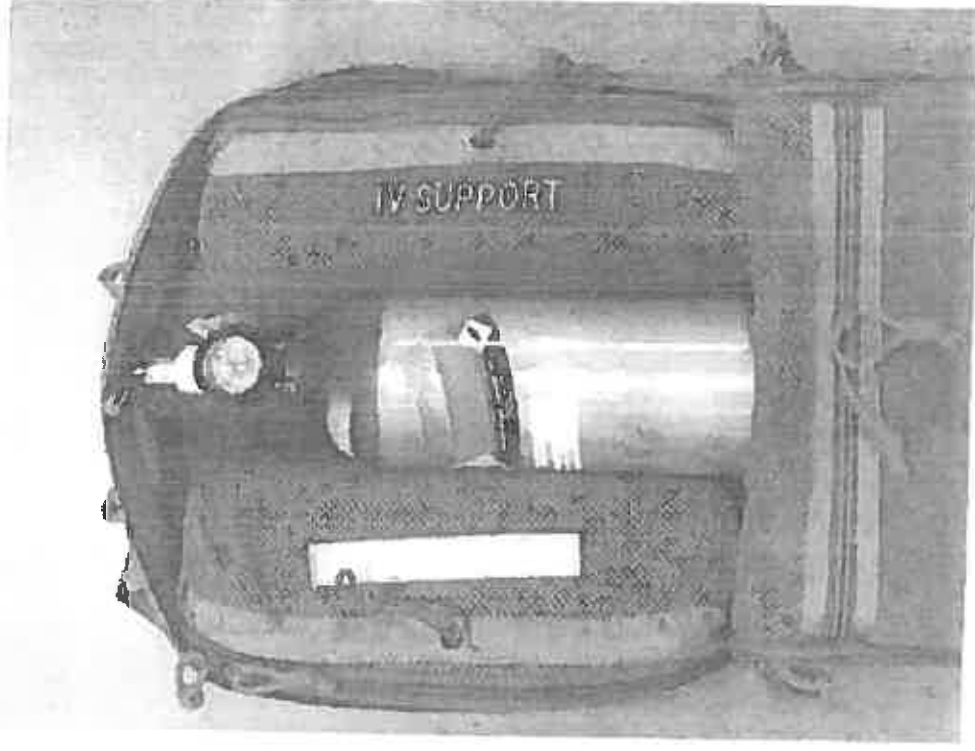
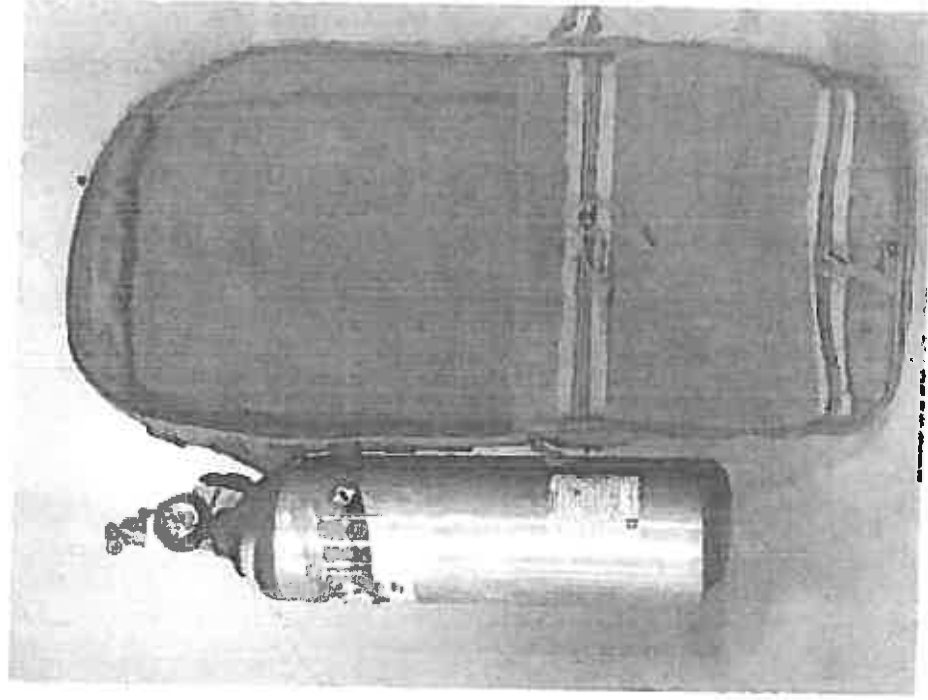

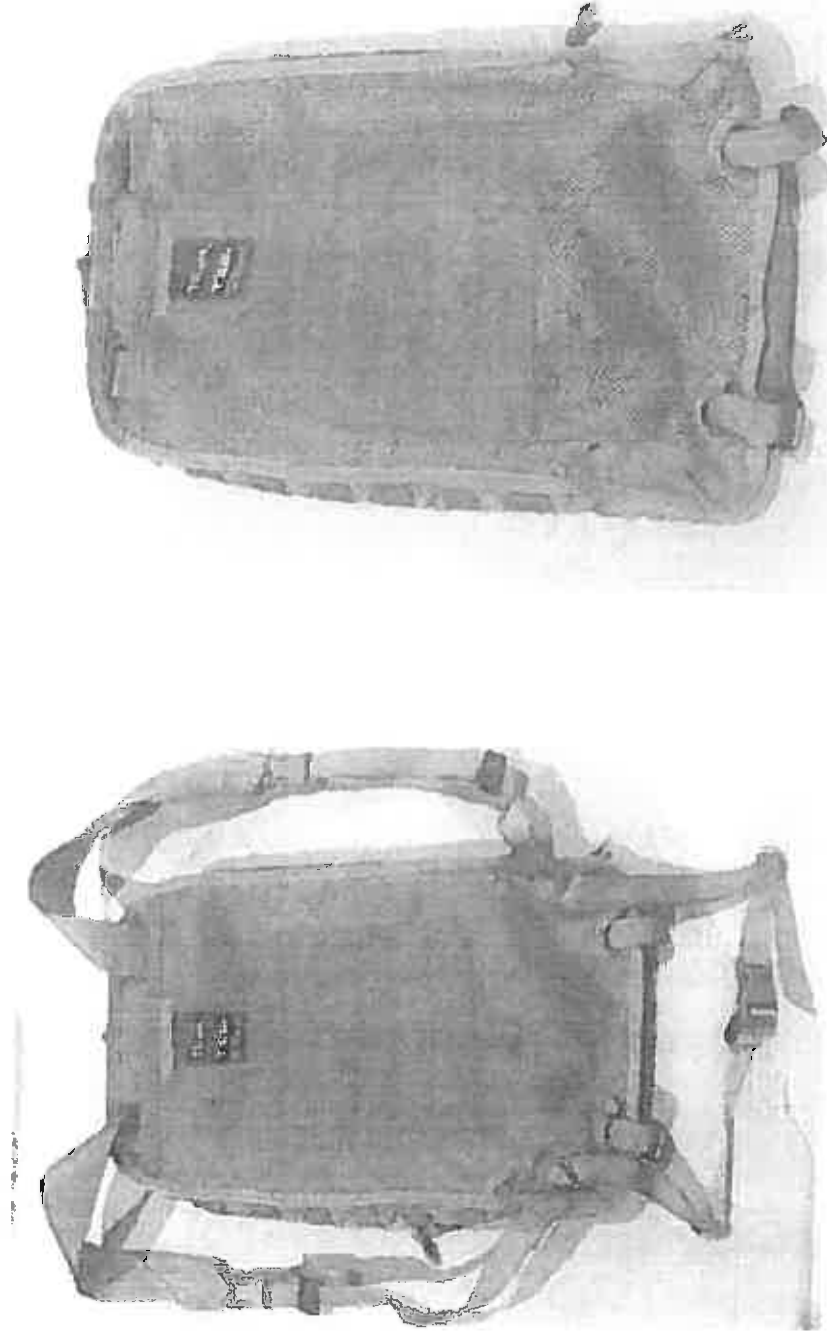

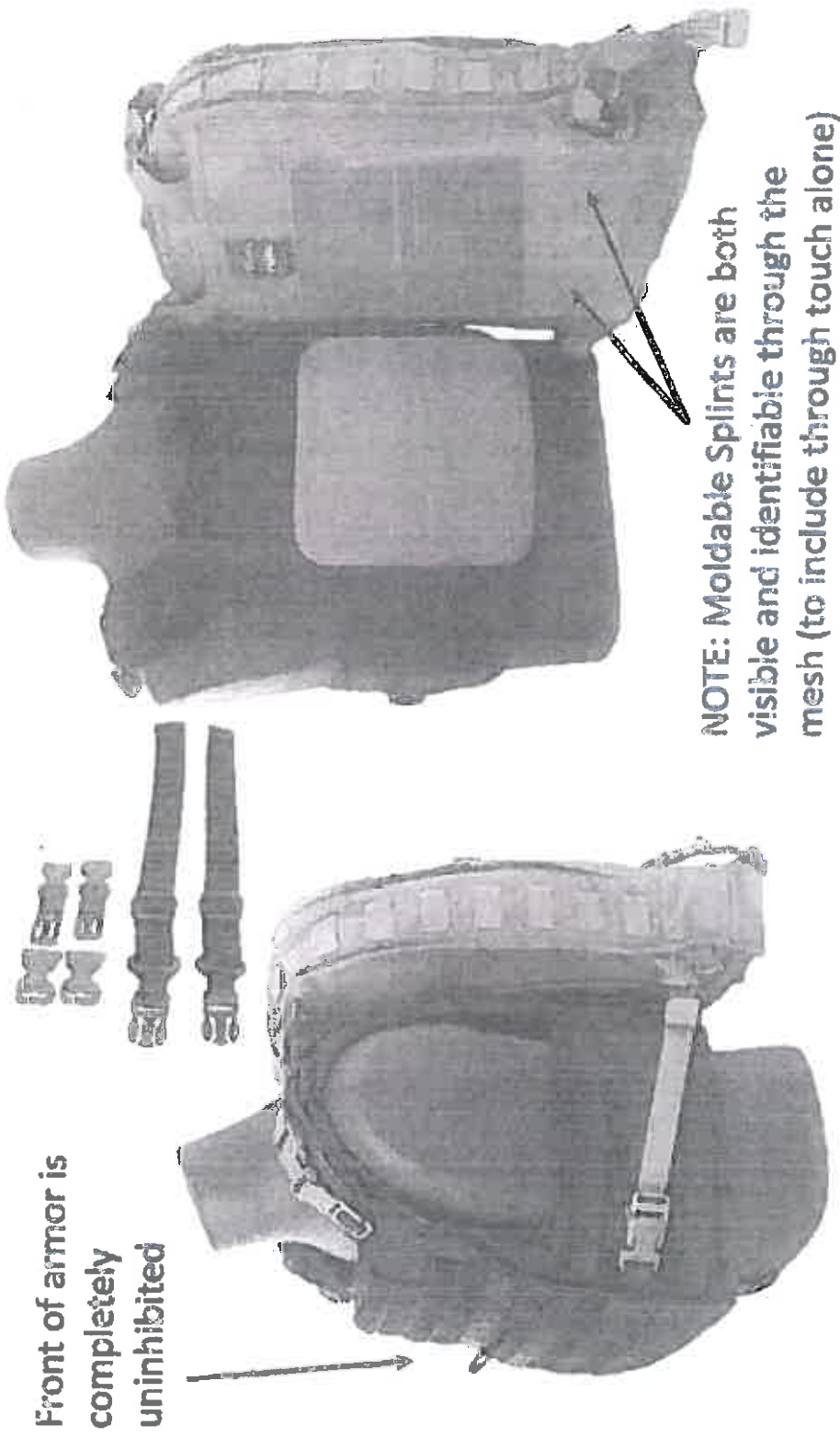

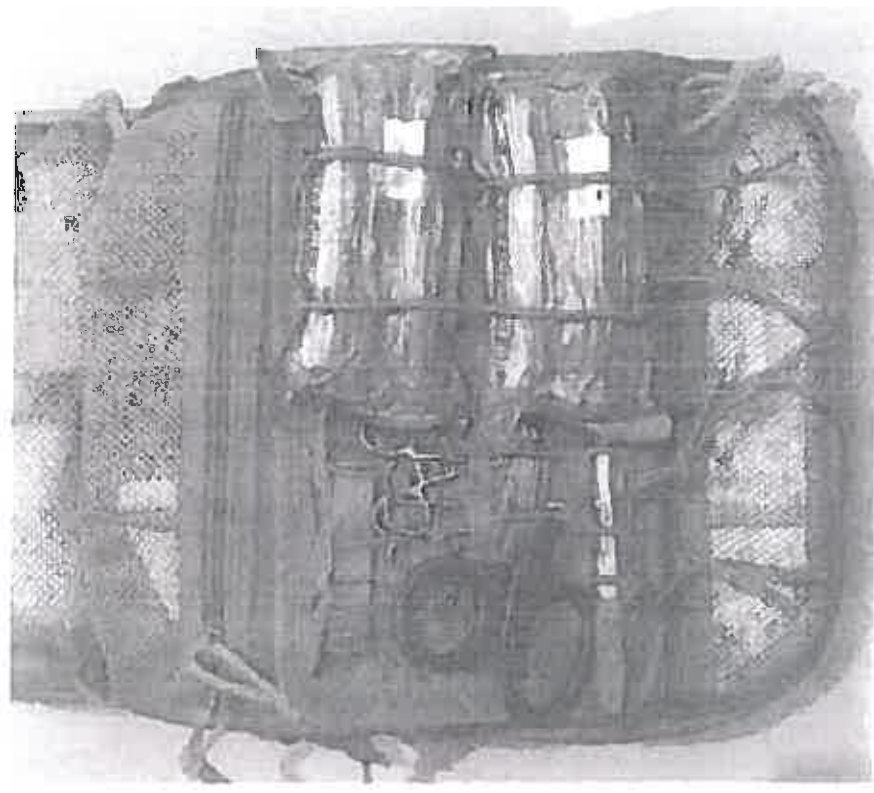

The Special Investigation Section is LAPD's tactical surveillance unit tasked with surveilling and apprehending the most violent felons. RHD/SIS Emergency Medical Technicians are responsible for providing First Aid and emergency medical treatment for sworn personnel, suspects, and civilians in the field. The requested bags, manufactured by Tactical and Survival Specialties, Inc., are more lightweight and compact than the bags currently in use by SIS Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs). They allow for more maneuverability and speed when deploying from vehicles during tactical incidents involving victims with traumatic injuries. These bags will provide identical continuity between Los Angeles Fire Department Tactical Emergency Medical Services (TEMS) units, Los Angeles Police Department Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) EMTs and SIS EMTs. The cost for the two Custom TSSI M-9 bags is \$2335.00, California tax is \$220.21, for a total cost of \$2555.21.

Building Healthier Communities

How Equine-Assisted Therapy Complements Community Policing

"I've never shared my story, the horse was safe and understanding. I realized I'm not alone and I have an inner strength and support to pick myself up."

It doesn't seem obvious how horses can impact a community and the policing of it by peace officers, but there is a path to building a healthier community through the gifts that a horse can provide. **Free Rein Foundation in Huntington Beach, California**, offers a unique and rewarding program that builds these healthier communities we all strive for.



Police officers also have a special place in building healthier communities. They work everyday deep within a neighborhood observing and interacting with every person. That role gives them a unique and powerful perspective of every member of that community, especially the kids. When times are tough, they are especially tough for the children who grow up in that neighborhood. Sometimes both parents are working multiple jobs to make ends meet, or perhaps one or both parents are just absent through abandonment or drugs. Children grow up in these environments without that essential feeling of safety when they are home and it is this anxiety that usually bubbles over into the areas where a police officer might get involved.

Why Horses?



To evade predators, horses have evolved over thousands of years with a heightened sense to environment. Since horses do not prey on others, they must be aware of the slightest clues to avoid becoming prey themselves. That means that they instinctively analyze and react to our body language. Ears up and they are searching for every non-verbal cue that could indicate to them the real intention of the animals or humans in their space. This unique talent makes them perfect for interacting in a group of kids trying to act cool among their peers.

But they are so big!

Large and powerful animals, it is hard to ignore a horse but have you ever tried to gain control over this intelligent animal? It is not easily done. And that is the first lesson that the kids learn from a horse: *reflection*.

When a group of children are face to face with the enormity of a horse, many for the very first time in their lives, a process begins to unfold that brings the children right back to their neighborhoods and home. Here is the world around us, large, powerful, often frightening and now we must stand before it and reflect on how we approach this horse and our lives.

How do I walk through my neighborhood? How do I face my violent and angry parents? How do I deal with these large, overwhelming things in my life?

When standing next to this large, powerful animal their presence requires an understanding of what communication is and how it has to be done in order to gain control and feel safe. But not every horse acts in the same way!

Gift Number Two

Every horse has its own personality, attitude, mood and demeanor, just like our parents, our siblings, our friends, and all the other people who live in our communities. Horses are a reflection of the overwhelming reality of our world, the human one, and it's that social role that they each play within their own herds that makes equine therapy so powerful in today's fast paced and overwhelming world.

8-Weeks of Counseling and Therapy Alongside a Horse

During Free Rein Foundations eight-week program, kids are faced with situations that are reflective of their home life. Issues like drug abuse, gangs, and violence are faced when the group enters the corral and are confronted by a horse. Equine therapists are observing the children and the horse interact. What is learned by interacting with this incredibly large and perceptive horse are the skills needed to manage the stress of everyday living.



Each session is three hours long. Two hours are spent in the open corral with the horses, and the third hour is for reflecting while enjoying the comfort of a shared meal. During this time the kids write in a special journal just for their experiences over the eight-weeks. They listen to invited guests who talk about a variety of activities, from art projects to community gardens, and they also have a moment to listen to each other reflect on their own feelings brought out by their time with the horses in the corral.

What Happens in The Corral...

The Equine Specialists are there to guide and direct the kids as they reflect and journal about what they are feeling. Sometimes a particular horse will focus on one of the children in the group, following them around, or just attempting to signal to the child that they understand. What is most astonishing is that the Equine Specialists do not attempt to control or direct what is happening in the corral. That activity is completely directed by the horses and the children. Different activities are outlined at the onset of each session, building obstacles in the path of the horse, or just directing the horses to move from one place to another. It is this activity where the horse's talents really take hold and where all the confusing and conflicting emotions for the children begin to bubble to the surface.

Kids learn about themselves through the interactions in the corral. They begin to see and understand their relationships with others by how they must learn to communicate with a horse – who doesn't happen to speak a language they understand, *at first*. Free Rein Foundations Equine specialists specifically address the issues that all children and teens are faced with everyday including peer pressure, bullying, drugs, gangs, leadership opportunities, and of course, the building of self-confidence.

Police Protection



Police officers are a vital part of the process for a program like the one Free Rein Foundation offers. They are in our communities and can identify kids who could use some help. Many times it is the local police officers who are bringing the kids to the program in Huntington Beach, and their participation is so empowering for both the officers and the kids. Having a police officer from the neighborhood participate during the program helps to create a supportive environment, not just for the kids participating in the corral, but also further strengthening a police officers community support overall.

Graduation



if you are ever lucky enough to attend a graduation from one of Free Rein Foundations eight-week programs, you would be offered a glimpse into the powerful bond these horses have with the kids. Free Rein Foundation's motto is *to heal humans and rescued horses by creating a bond that empowers and nurtures both.*

Dealing with challenging issues or suffering from an emotional illness is not just something children and adults face. Horses are abused and abandoned at an alarming rate. Free Rein Foundation has not only been able to rescue them, but they offer healing and support that allows these same animals to not only use their special intuitive powers to heal others, but also, through their own life challenges of survival in a human world, to share an understanding and compassion for others who are also suffering.

It is a powerful combination that offers a community many deep and lasting benefits long after the eight-weeks are over. The children are changed and aware of their own abilities to cope with challenging situations. Their parents and family members are seeing first hand how these kids are managing difficult moments differently. The police officers are given a lasting reward that will begin to heal and help the community they serve. Everyone heals.

How You Can Help

Beyond the corrals, Free Rein Foundation is searching for opportunities to work alongside the people of their community to make a lasting impact that benefits everyone. They sponsor nature hikes and beach clean-ups, and invite inner city kids out to the beaches for their first surfing experiences. They work with Veterans to overcome the difficult emotions brought out by war, and they work with local businesses to help their teams work together in a more productive and healthy way.

The Free Rein Foundation lives and works within the special community at the Huntington Central Park Equestrian Center, inviting families and community members to see different types of horse riding; to come and enjoy a Hug & Groom held on the first Sunday of every month; or to bring awareness to the special powers that live within horses through one of the many national horse days that are celebrated like *#HelpAHorseDay* (4/26) or *#ILoveHorsesDay* (7/15), or their absolute favorite, *#DayOfTheHorse* every December 13th.

SUBJECT: NEWLY APPROVED UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT
ITEMS – APRIL 2019

The Uniform and Equipment Committee (UEC), and the Chief of Police, have approved the following uniform and equipment items:

1. APPROVAL FOR THE WEAR OF THE TEAM WENDY EXFIL AND THE OPS CORE FAST BALLISTIC HELMET FOR GANG AND NARCOTICS DIVISION AND ROBBERY HOMICIDE DIVISION

The Ops Core FAST and Team Wendy Exfil are department approved ballistic helmets for Metropolitan Division, Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) and Metropolitan K-9 only. Both helmets provide superior performance including greater ballistic protection, increased stability and retention, lighter weight and the capability for attachments.

The Gang and Narcotics Division (GND), field apprehension units and Robbery Homicide Division (RHD), Special Investigative Section (SIS) requested approval for the wear of the Team Wendy Exfil and Ops Core FAST ballistic helmets. These units work in plain clothes capacity and are responsible for apprehending high-risk violent criminals, including surveillance, high risk vehicle and pedestrian stops, and search warrant service.

Therefore, the Uniform and Equipment Committee and the Chief of Police have approved the wear of both the Ops Core FAST and Team Wendy Exfil ballistic helmets for Gang and Narcotics Division (GND), specifically field apprehension units and Robbery Homicide Division (RHD), specifically Special Investigative Section (SIS).

Note: Absent available City funding, GND, field apprehension units and RHD, Special Investigative Section are authorized to wear these helmets through private purchase.

**2. APPROVAL TO ADD SINATRA UNIFORM, INC. AS A
LOS ANGELES POLICE DEPARTMENT APPROVED PRIVATE PURCHASE
UNIFORM**

Los Angeles Police Department (LAPD) personnel have been and continue to purchase Sinatra Uniform, Inc. uniforms. Currently, Sinatra Uniform, Inc. is not a LAPD approved vendor or manufacturer.

The Sinatra uniforms far exceeds LAPD standards and specifications, maintaining a professional appearance. The Sinatra uniform specifications are as follows:

- 8818 Navy, LAPD dark navy blue, Burlington Resford Mill, 100% worsted wool
- Medium weight 13-13.5 ounce wool, tensile strength-warp 120 pounds/filling 100 pounds
- Heavy weight 16.5-17 ounce wool, tensile strength-warp 140 pounds/filling pounds

The Uniform and Equipment Committee and the Chief of Police have approved to add Sinatra Uniform, Inc. as a Los Angeles Police Department approved vendor and manufacturer, and therefore, allow personnel to continue private purchase, following Department guidelines.

SUBJECT: LOS ANGELES POLICE FOUNDATION GRANT REQUEST – BALLISTIC HELMETS FOR SPECIAL INVESTIGATION SECTION, RESTRICTED ACCOUNT

Robbery Homicide Division (RHD)–Special Investigation Section (SIS), is requesting the approval for the purchase of ballistic helmets. The approval of this grant benefits the Department as follows:


The Special Investigation Section is the Los Angeles Police Department's (LAPD) tactical surveillance unit that is assigned to apprehend the most dangerous and violent felons. As a result, occasional consideration of improved tactical equipment is conducted. Compared to the Department issued helmet, the requested helmets, manufactured by Team Wendy, are lighter in weight, have a slimmer profile, provide greater ballistic protection, allows for an attachment of a Night Operation Device (NOD), and the simultaneous wearing of a noise cancelling communication device to promote greater situational awareness.

Additionally, the helmets allow for more maneuverability and speed when deploying from vehicles during the teams' high risk stops/arrests. These helmets were reviewed and approved for SIS use by the Department's Uniform Committee in April of 2019.

SIS currently deploys 24 ballistic helmets that were previously assigned to Metropolitan Division. All the helmets are considered expired and have exceeded the five-year ballistic warranty.
