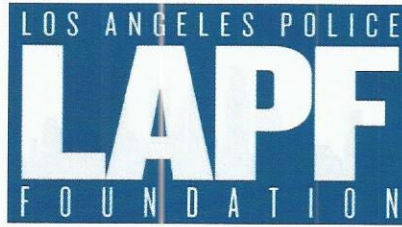

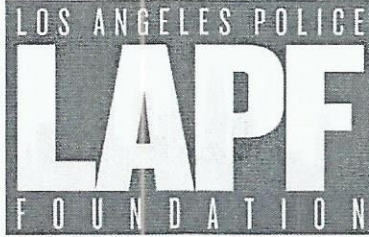

The Los Angeles Police Department is committed to better serving the diverse communities in the City of Los Angeles. The Office of Operations-Public Engagement Section (PES) supports this effort by supporting programming, on-going working groups and events throughout each year. The LGBTQ+ Outreach liaison officer establishes long-term relationships with community members, leaders and stakeholders on behalf of the Department under the leadership of the Department LGBTQ+ Outreach Coordinator, Commander Ruby Flores. The LGBTQ+ Liaison regularly works with the LGBTQ+ community and with Department personnel to address any issues that come up with regards to law enforcement and the community and work to implement various programs to ensure that the Department continues to build trust and long-lasting relationships with the LGBTQ+ community.

If no, please explain the reason why it was not submitted: The LGBTQ+ Outreach Program has historically been grant-funded.

What objectives will be accomplished if the funding is granted?

The LGBTQ+ Outreach Program strives to continue its ongoing relationships with the LGBTQ+ community through its various programs such as supporting the projects and policy recommendations of the LAPD LGBTQ+ Working Group, facilitating and coordinating the Chief of Police LGBTQ+ Community Forums, the Board of Police Commissioners LGBTQ+ Employee Mixer, and working closely with the LGBTQ+ community groups and service providers to address issues that impact public safety and the community.

The LGBTQ+ Outreach Program seeks to build trust between law enforcement and the LGBTQ+ community by hosting an LGBTQ+ Community Police Academy (CPA); by the development of the Transgender /Gender Non-Conforming Employee Handbook; continuing the LGBTQ+ Cultural Competency Training for officers Department-wide; by developing a LAPD/LGBTQ+ historic timeline; and by supporting programming that brings together LAPD personnel and the community to dialogue and discuss ways to improve outreach efforts.

Historically, crime reporting in the LGBTQ+ community has been extremely underreported. These efforts improve crime reporting and overall community safety. These efforts also improve the understanding between LAPD officers and the community through cultural competency training and the events that bring all community stakeholders together.

How many officers will be impacted with this grant?

This grant will impact all sworn officers within the Los Angeles Police Department. Funding will go towards a multitude of items, including: LGBTQ+ supportive uniform pins, printing/resource guides, safe place stickers, multiple events throughout the year, and the LGBTQ+ Cultural Competency Training (which is still on-going) throughout the Department and will help fund the Community Instructors that come to provide insight and real-life stories to engage officers taking the course. The LGBTQ+ liaison also provides guidance to the Human Relations Unit at Training Division in selecting LGBTQ+ LAPD personnel to speak as a guest speaker during LD 42 (LGBTQ+ Cultural Competency).

How will the community be impacted by this grant?

The community will be able to participate in the community events and programming that are designed to give an opportunity to build trust and partnerships between stakeholders and the LAPD through events such as the Days of Dialogue, Community Forums, Working groups and Pride Parades.

This grant will also directly impact the work of the LAPD LGBTQ+ Working Group, which is an Ad Hoc Committee designed to make policy and project recommendations to the LAPD that would improve trust and public safety in the community. For example, the Working Group successfully recommended and developed the Hate Crimes Supplemental Report, which has improved how officers handle hate crimes and hate incidents. This committee has also developed the LAPD Safe Place program, which brings together our businesses and non-profit organizations together to show support for the LGBTQ+ community and to also improve crime reporting. These are just a few of the programs that have come to fruition through past support from an LAPF Grant.

Describe the short-term outcome and long-term impact you anticipate within the Department and in the community it serves as result of this grant.

The short-term outcome includes providing events and venues to have the Department and the LGBTQ+ community meet to start meaningful dialogue, establish new relationships in various parts of the community, and continue to build partnership to ensure that we are all working towards a safer and inclusive environment.

Long-term impact would be that the Department will have a stronger relationship with the LGBTQ+ community and that our LAPD personnel will have knowledge and better serve this community both externally and internally. The overall goal is to support and further the efforts to ensure equality and equity for all people regardless of gender, gender identity, gender expression and sexual orientation.

How can the Foundation evaluate success if the funding is granted? (# of people served, objectives reached, surveys, etc.)

The success of the grant can be evaluated by polling community members and/or LAPD personnel either through event and training evaluations or surveys, by the numbers of reported hate crimes and hatred incidents, which has historically been underreported in the community and the number of long-term sustainable partnerships with key community groups and leaders.



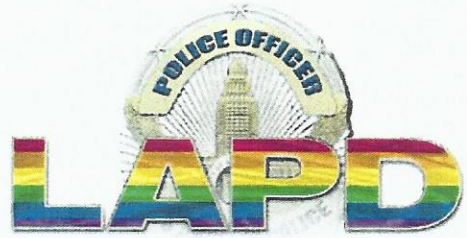

LAPD Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Questioning (LGBTQ+) Outreach Program Fact Sheet



Updated: June 6, 2022

Summary:

The Los Angeles Police Department is committed to better serving the diverse communities in the City of Los Angeles. The LAPD supports this effort by having dedicated, full-time personnel assigned as liaisons. The LGBTQ+ Liaison establishes long-term relationships with community members, leaders and stakeholders on behalf of the Department under the leadership of the Department LGBTQ+ Outreach Program Coordinator, Commander Ruby Flores. The LGBTQ+ Liaison works closely with the LGBTQ+ Outreach Program Coordinator to collaborate with community stakeholders to address public safety and law enforcement issues that impact the LGBTQ+ community.

Regular Standing Meetings:

LAPD LGBTQ+ Working Group Meetings – These are meetings set based on the availability of the Department LGBTQ+ Coordinator’s schedule. Ideally these meetings are once a month.

Transgender Advisory Council (TAC) Meetings – These meetings are on the third Thursday of each month and have been taking place via Zoom.

Transgender Service Provider Network Meetings – This a monthly meeting, which LAPD LGBTQ+ liaisons once attended as members. However, due to a request from some of the service providers, we no longer attend this event.

LAPD LGBTQ+ Outreach Events and Programs:

LGBTQ+ Working Group Meetings (various dates):

The LGBTQ+ Working Group consists of approximately 25-30 community members and activists, members of various service providers throughout the City. The Department holds approximately eight working group meetings per calendar year. Approximately 15-25 people attend each meeting. Due to COVID, these meetings have moved to Zoom (virtual) and the program is in the process of setting up hybrid (in-person and virtual) meetings.

Chief of Police (COP) LGBTQ+ Community Forum(s) (Spring and Fall):

The purpose of the LGBTQ+ Community Forum is to provide insight into the community’s concerns. It is an essential communication link between our police department and the LGBTQ+ Community. Historically, The COP hosts two forums a year. Before the Forum, there is typically a catered reception with food and various (non-alcoholic) beverages. The forum features keynote speakers on topics that directly impact the LGBTQ+ community such as hate crimes and law enforcement interactions with the community. Past forums have also been replaced by special events. For example, in 2016, the Spring COP forum was a special event (the LAPD Safety and Health Fair). The Fall COP forum was a special LGBTQ+ community specific Days of Dialogue, which was held at the California Endowment in October of 2016.

Board of Police Commissioners LGBTQ+ Employee Reception (June):

In celebration of LGBTQ+ Pride Month in June, the Board of Police Commission (BOPC) sponsors an LGBTQ+ Employee Reception to celebrate diversity, individuality and pride within the Department. It is attended by sworn and civilian personnel. The reception typically hosts about 100 to 120 personnel. The LGBTQ+ Liaison coordinates this event in conjunction with the Department LGBTQ+ Coordinator on the set up and execution of this event.

Pride Parades:

Historically, the LAPD participates and marches in three Pride Parades: Long Beach (May); Los Angeles (June); and, Palm Springs (November). These events are done in collaboration with LAPD Recruitment Unit, who sends recruiters and the LAPD Hummer. During the parade, officers hand out LAPD give away items for the spectators. Depending on the location of the Parade, there are anywhere from tens of thousands (Palm Springs) to several hundred thousand spectators (Long Beach and Los Angeles). This year, there has been a transition of the Christopher Street West (CSW) Board. Due to this transition and the change of LGBTQ+ liaisons at various agencies, the LAPD will have limited participation at these events.

LGBTQ+ Community Police Academy:

The Department hopes to provide a greater awareness and understanding of law enforcement's role in the community through the education provided by the Community Police Academy (CPA). The curriculum and teaching methods are similar to the traditional law enforcement academy. There are various presentations, including narcotics enforcement, domestic violence, biased policing, youth programs, community relations and the role of Internal Affairs. The class participates in a tour of the LAPD Academy, as well as the Communications facility. The CPA meets for 9 consecutive weeks. In 2015, there were 15 students enrolled in the CPA. This program occurs once every two years.

LGBTQ+ Cultural Competency Training:

Training Division has integrated the LGBTQ+ Cultural Competency Training into the Field Training Officer (FTO) Update Course and Supervisors School. There is a 3-hour training in the Recruit Academy as a part of Learning Domain 42. We will be looking to add the regular FTO School and Watch Commander's School in the future to ensure that this training is reinforced and consistent.

LGBTQ+ Pride Pins:

In 2021, the LAPD was able to produce and get approval for Pride Pins. This year, through the LA Police Foundation Grant, we were able to purchase and distribute over 1,500 pins, which allows LAPD personnel to show support for the LGBTQ+ Communities. A future project would be to allow officers to wear nameplates with their pronouns or "Ask me my pronouns."

Past Special Events and Projects funded by LA Police Foundation Grant:

LAPD SAFE PLACE Initiative:

This program is modeled after the Seattle Police Department initiative where participating business and organizations would place decals in their windows denoting the location as a "LAPD SAFE PLACE". A victim of a violent crime can run to that location and get help calling 9-1-1 and the business or organization will agree to provide a "safe place" for that crime victim until police arrive. This program consists of: website (in development); an information packet for participants (in development); and decals. This program rolled out in 2017.

LAPD LGBTQ+ Resource Safety List (Brochure):

The LAPD Working Group proposed this project in 2016 after completing the Hate Crimes Supplemental Report and the creation of the LGBTQ+ Cultural Competency training. The brochure contains information on crisis hotlines, legal assistance, health and social services, housing assistance and basic contact information for major public agencies. This was published in June 2017.

LGBTQ+ Immigration Town Hall Meeting (12/15/2016 and 1/18/2017)

LAPD Northeast Division and the Wall Las Memorias Project (TWLMP) coordinated two LGBTQ+ community Immigration town hall meetings where LAPD immigration policy subject matter experts, local service providers and community members had an opportunity to ask questions regarding the LAPD's policy on immigration. The LGBTQ+ Liaisons provided general support for this event.

Models of Pride (Largest LGBTQ+ Youth Conference) August 2015 and 2016 & October 2017:

For three years in a row, the LAPD has been able to hold a workshop at the largest LGBTQ Youth Conference in the United States, which is held annual at USC in August. In 2015, the LAPD held a panel with LGBTQ+ and allied LAPD personnel to speak to LGBTQ+ Youth about what it is like to serve in the Department whether as an LGBTQ+ officer or an allied officer. In 2016, the LAPD invited LGBTQ+ representatives from allied agencies to participate in a multi-agency panel.

LGBTQ+ Safety & Health Fair (April 23, 2016):

In 2015, the Department worked closely with community partners to determine some of the key issues faced by the LGBTQ+ Community at large in the City of Los Angeles. The Department concluded that family and social isolation as a result of one's sexual orientation and/or gender identity is a large problem that can eventually lead to homelessness, drug/alcohol addiction, human trafficking and survival sex work. The Department partnered with LGBTQ+ organizations to find a proactive approach to addressing some of these problems by organizing a resource fair, which offered the LGBTQ+ Community resources that focus on one's overall well-being. There were three major components to the Fair. First, there were informational breakout sessions about healthy relationships, Immigrant rights, human trafficking and living with HIV/AIDS. Another component was the resource fair, which gave the community an opportunity to see the many resources

available to them. And lastly, there were prospective employers on site who were interested in hiring members of the LGBTQ+ Community.

There were over 100 community members that attended the Safety and Health Fair in 2016.

Transgender Walk of Remembrance (November 19, 2015):

For the first time ever, a law enforcement agency sponsored an event to commemorate the lives of Transgender individuals murdered in 2015. This event was spearheaded by Assistant Chief Beatrice Girmala to show solidarity with the Transgender and LGBTQ+ communities. The event started at Hollywood and Western and participants marched to the Black Cat Tavern, which was the site of one of the first LGBTQ+ protests in the United States when LAPD Vice raided the bar on New Year's Day of 1967. It was a moment for LAPD and the community to reflect together on the progress made since then and to think about what needs to be done going forward. The event kicked off with comments from Trans community leaders, Chief Charlie Beck, Assistant Chief Beatrice Girmala and Councilmember David Ryu. By the time the march ended, there were about 60 to 70 people in attendance.
