**SUBJECT: 2<sup>nd</sup> QUARTER REPORT TO BOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS ON HOMELESSNESS AND MENTAL ILLNESS**

### **RECOMMENDED ACTION**

That the Board of Police Commissioners REVIEW and FILE this 2nd Quarter Report on Homelessness and Mental Illness.

### **DISCUSSION**

On April 4, 2017, the Board of Police Commissioners (BOPC) held a public, single purpose meeting related to issues involving homelessness. As a result of the meeting, the BOPC requested a quarterly report be submitted from the Department on homelessness and mental illness. Specifically, the BOPC requested information be broken down by geographic Bureau and Area for the Resources Enhancement Services Enforcement Team (RESET), the System-Wide Mental Assessment Response Team (SMART), and the Homeless Outreach and Proactive Engagement Team (HOPE) to address the following:

- Number of contacts of homeless and mentally ill individuals;
- Number referred to housing to include:
  - Number accepted into housing vs. number who did not accept housing
- Number referred to services in addition to housing;
- Number of homeless and mentally ill as victims of crime including type of crime;
- Number of homeless and mentally ill arrested and type of crime;
- Number of NCUOF and CUOF incidents involving homeless or mentally ill community members.

With the exception of the use of force data, the information that was initially requested was only available for our HOPE teams. RESET teams had not originally been directed to capture this data. However, after examining our data capturing systems during the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Report for both teams and in hopes of conducting a more thorough analysis, Operations-Central Bureau directed RESET to implement the standardized HOPE metric sheet that is used by each HOPE team to collect actionable data. This sheet captures the number of individuals contacted, identifies the type of individual contacted (i.e. Mental Illness, Substance Abuse User, Gang Member, Parole/Probation, etc.), referral services offered, enforcement action taken, and type of housing accepted. This information will be captured daily and reported to the Homeless

Coordinator at the end of every month. The RESET data will be incorporated into the 3<sup>rd</sup> Quarter report.

During the first two quarters of 2017, HOPE teams have contacted approximately 7,610 persons who are homeless. Of those, 1,023 have self-identified as suffering from a mental illness.

Of the 7,610 homeless individuals who were contacted by our HOPE teams, there were 1,647 who were referred to housing. Unfortunately, only 298 individuals accepted the various forms of housing that were offered. There was a total of 3,353 who refused placement efforts all together. Additionally, 2,704 of these individuals accepted various forms of referral services other than housing that included Veteran Affairs services, Mental Health services, substance abuse programs, various counseling services, alternative prosecution programs, state identification obtainment services, social security card services, general relief, animal services, as well as medical services. A complete breakdown of these contacts and outreach efforts are included as an attachment.

Homeless and mentally ill individuals continue to be some of the most vulnerable people in our community. During the first two quarters of 2017, there have been 1,207 incidents where homeless individuals have been victimized. This represents a one-percent increase for the same period last year. Some of the crimes they were victim to included aggravated assaults, robberies, thefts, and rapes.

Of the reported crimes during this same time frame, individuals suffering from mental illness were victimized on 52 occasions. Most of the crimes they were victim to included aggravated assaults and rapes. As discussed previously, anecdotal evidence suggests many crimes against the mentally ill often go unreported and this number may be artificially low. As a result, the Department is working to identify coding issues to more accurately capture this data in the future. The Homeless Coordinator will liaison with CompStat to implement best practices and to ensure reporting is as accurate as possible. One concern related to this is determining the appropriate standard that will be used to verify mental health status of the contacted persons.

HOPE teams arrested a total of 647 homeless and mentally ill individuals during the first two quarters of 2017. A total of 1,845 homeless and mentally ill individuals were arrested city-wide during this same time frame, which represents a 49 percent increase for the same period last year. This increase does not necessarily represent an increase in actual arrests but is indicative of improved coding of reports. The crimes they were arrested for included aggravated assault, burglary, disorderly conduct, embezzlement, fraud, forgery, larceny, rape, receiving stolen property, robbery, vehicle theft, and various other weapons charges. A complete breakdown of these arrests is also included as an attachment.

SMART teams track the number of calls for service, psychiatric holds and referrals to other services only. They do not, however, have the ability to offer placement for housing. Department SMART teams handled 4,306 calls for service during the first two quarters of 2017 which represents a 23 percent increase compared to 2016. These calls for service resulted in 3,344 involuntary psychiatric holds, a seven-percent increase from 2016. Additionally, SMART teams made 404 referrals to other resources for those individuals who did not meet the criteria for a psychiatric hold compared to 366 the previous year.

City-wide, there have been 1,072 use of force incidents during the first two quarters of 2017. RESET has had 16 use of force incidents during the first two quarters in 2017 as compared to 26 use of force incidents during the same time frame in 2016. RESET officers are specifically assigned to a 52-square block area that constitutes Skid Row, which represents the most concentrated area of homeless individuals in the county. RESET officers contend daily with individuals experiencing complex issues surrounding homelessness (i.e. substance abuse and mental health issues).

While all RESET officers have received Mental Health Intervention Training and continue to receive Department-wide de-escalation training regularly (i.e. Use of Force Update and Biased Policing/Below 100 Training), the individuals they regularly encounter in this area have a higher propensity to present a serious risk to the safety of the public, officers, and themselves.

HOPE Teams, who typically engage in problem solving oriented policing and whose contact with the homeless is not necessarily dictated by radio calls for service, have had three use of force incidents during the first two quarters of 2017 while contacting over 7,610 individuals who were homeless and/or suffered from mental illness. Since the first HOPE team did not launch until April 2016, a comparative analysis for the first two quarters of 2016 was not available.

As a result of the 1<sup>st</sup> Quarter Report, the BOPC also requested the following additional information that was not previously reported:

- Number of homeless victims – By type of crime, race, and gender;
- Gang, Narcotics, Prostitution, and Human Trafficking activity in the Skid Row Area;
- Analysis of Domestic Violence involving homeless

This additional information is included as an attachment.


